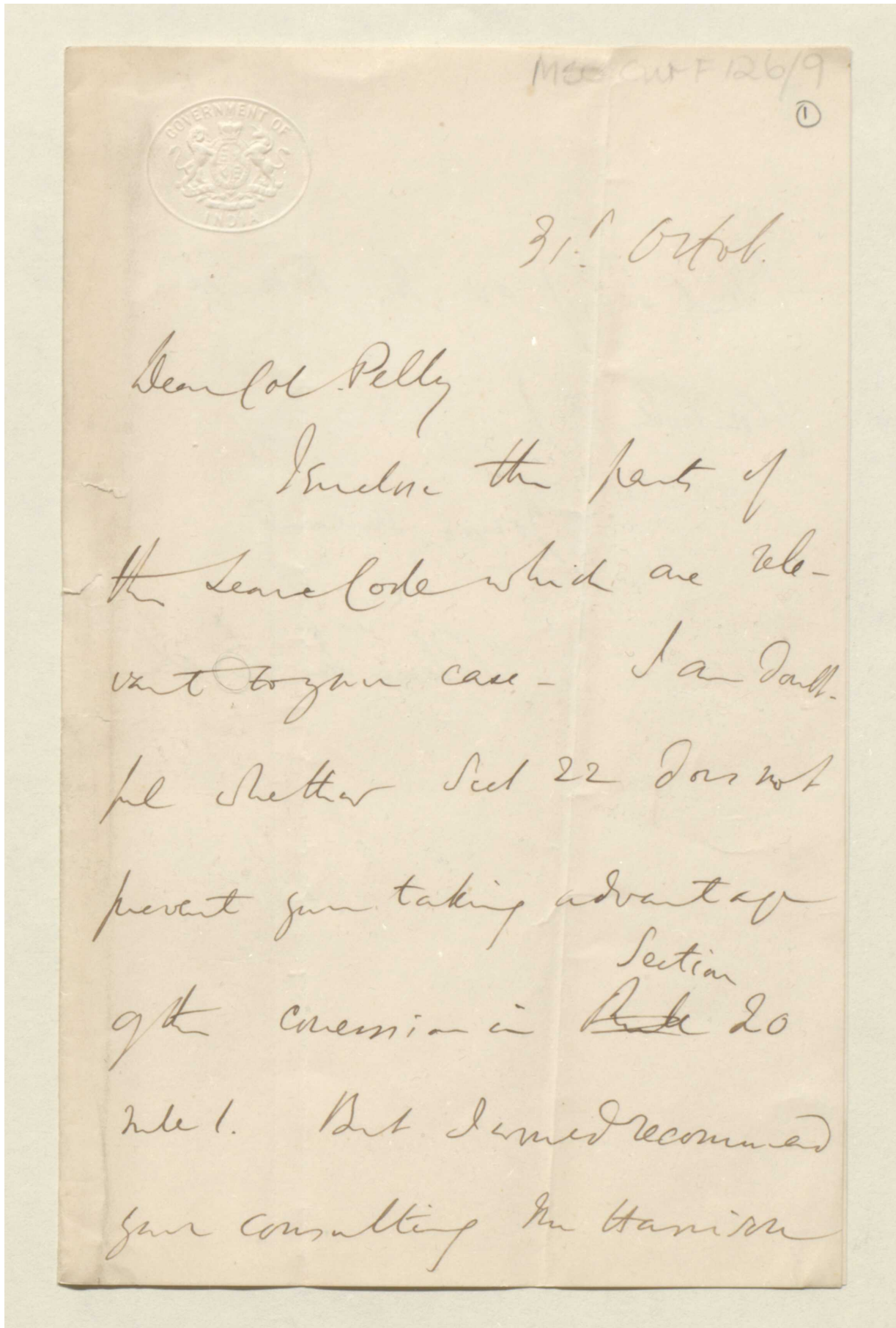

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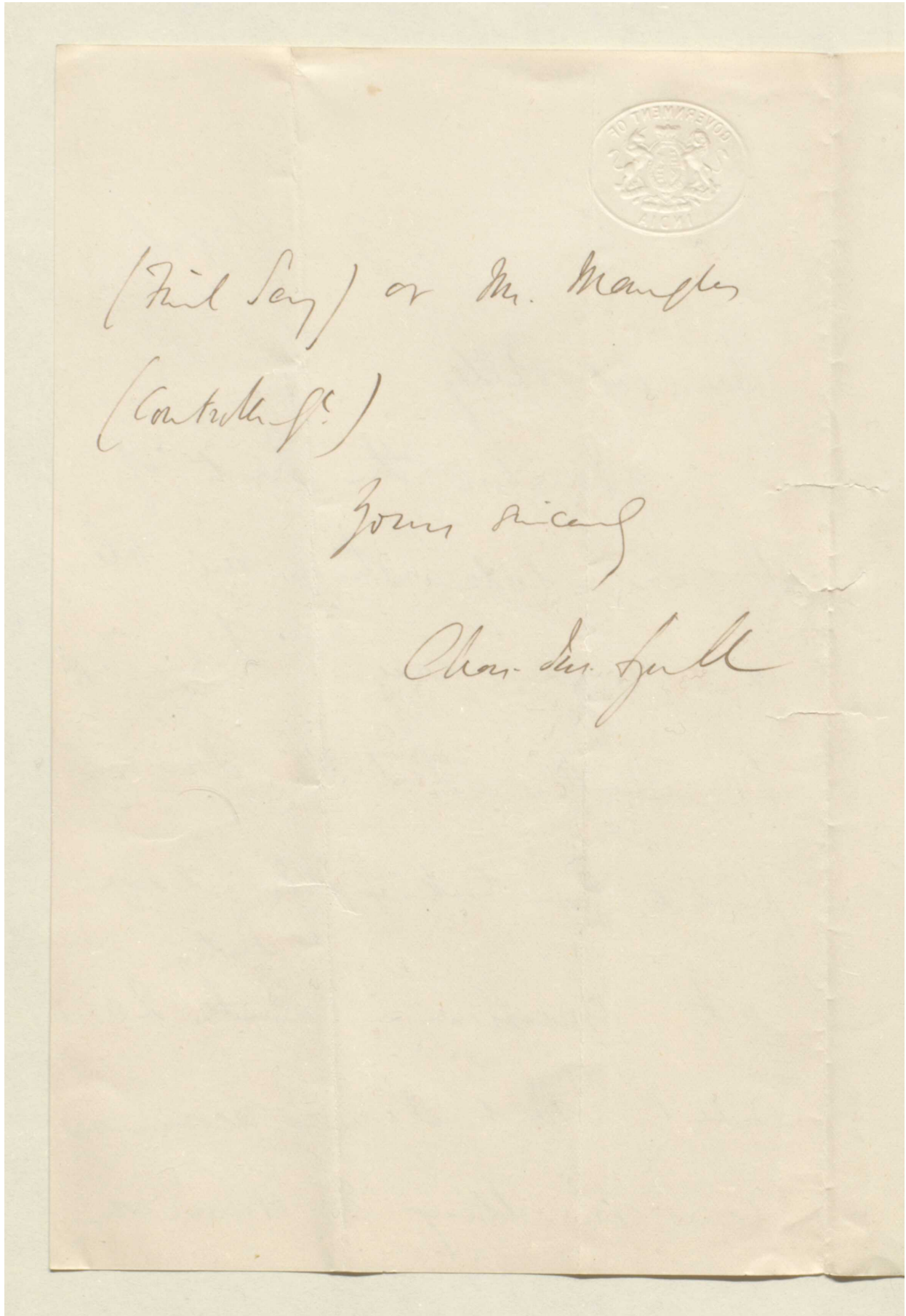
### **About this record**

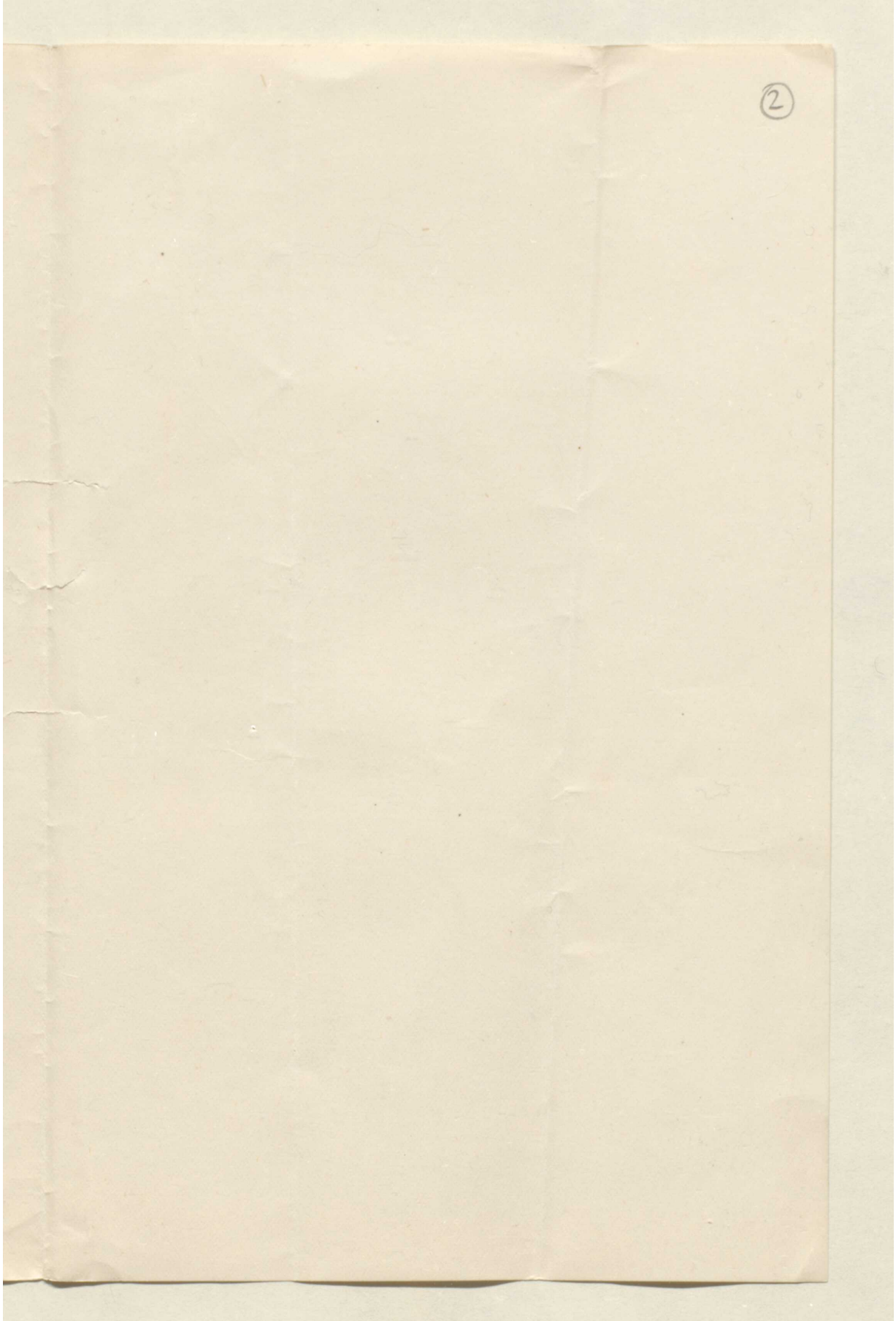

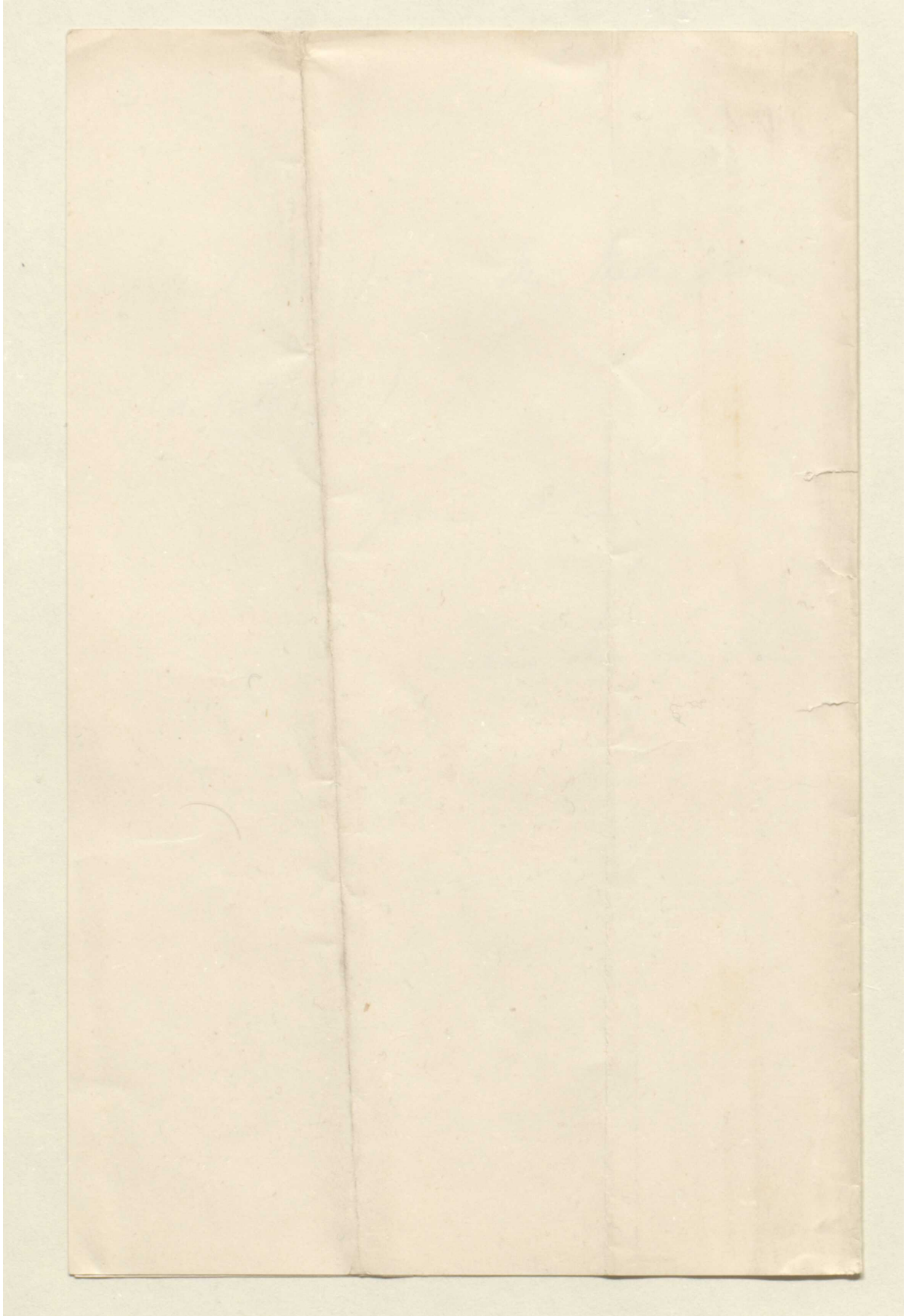
Letter from Charles du Lyall, Government of India to Colonel Lewis Pelly [1v]

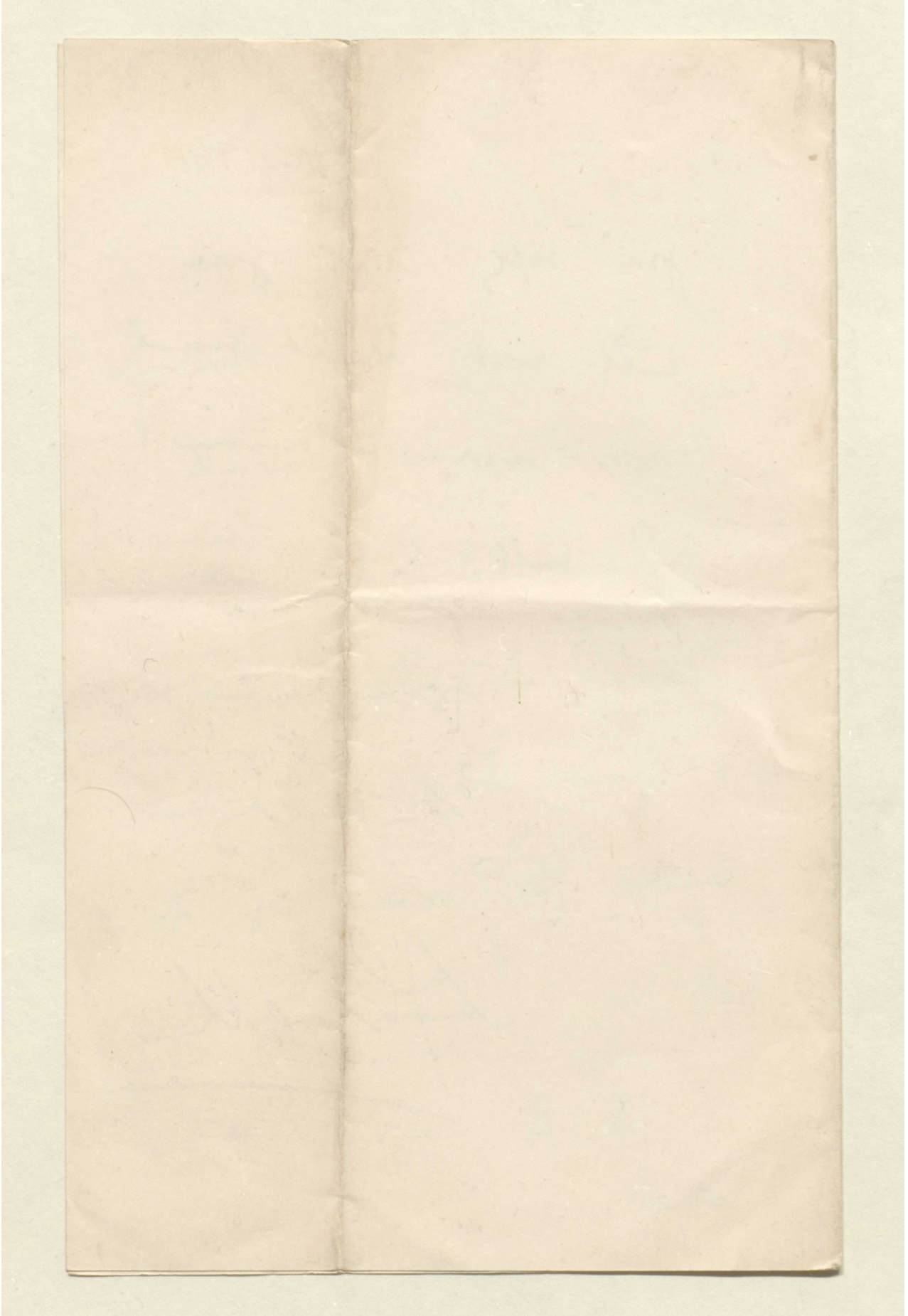

Jeypore

My dear Sir Lewis Pelly -

I am afraid that some  
misapprehension may have been  
caused by the non-delivery to me  
for a day or two of telegrams  
and letters addressed to me  
at Jeypore before the 13th  
November. I had taken an  
understanding to be that I  
should await at Agra the



telegram in which you  
would finally communicate the  
date at which you had  
divested yourself of the charge of  
the Agency; and that I should  
afterward proceed to Jeypore. It  
was not my intention to cross  
the border into Rajpootana  
until I should have heard  
from you; I thought this the  
safest plan, as you might

profitably find it expedient to <sup>(7)</sup>  
retain charge a day or two  
longer than you had originally  
proposed. But I am sorry  
to learn from my wife that  
your telegrams to me seemed  
to have remained unanswered  
without any apparent reason -  
and I hope you will accept  
this explanation.  
I have been staying here for  
a week, thanks to Mrs  
Beynon's kind hospitality -

and now that my wife has  
arrived I start to-morrow  
morning for Agmer.

The Uwar succession has not  
yet been settled, so far as I have  
heard. I saw Powlett here, and  
I was not exactly satisfied with  
the way in which he seemed  
to be managing the case; I was  
rather afraid that things might  
get complicated; but the orders  
<sup>since</sup> received from Government placed

matters in the right line. Powlett  
seems a good and zealous  
Officer, but not precisely a diplomatist.

I am a good deal impressed, already,  
with the difficulties under which  
you must have been carrying on  
work. The Agency Office appears  
to me never to have been  
systematically organized; and I  
guess that Mr Hornumjee is hardly

the man for his place. But  
as I have only had Elliott to  
oppose me perhaps I have as yet  
had no fair opportunity of  
forming even a private  
judgment. My business, however,  
is not to break up existing  
arrangements, but to carry on  
business with the available  
machinery until you return.  
Nevertheless, if you think that

As Mrs Pelly will shortly be proceeding to Aboos, I do not respectfully ask your orders regarding your things, especially with regard to the vases which are closed in the lower godown, and the screens curtains, cushions and small Carpets put away in the ward robe and sealed. A few days ago on passing through Seypore with Mrs Pelly on his way back from Uluwra, I spoke to Mrs Beynon about these things, & she said that I should write and ask you if Mrs Pelly may have the

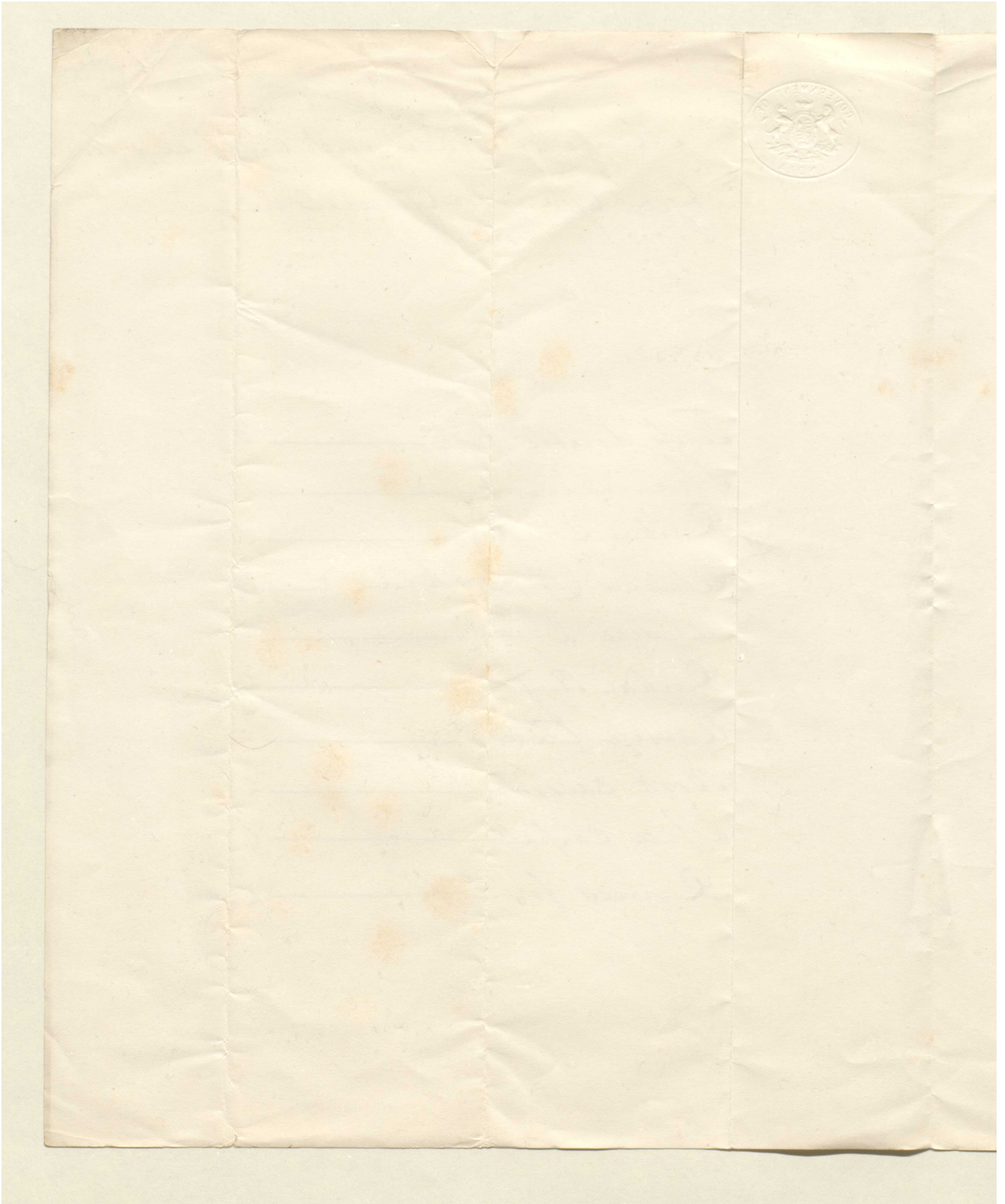

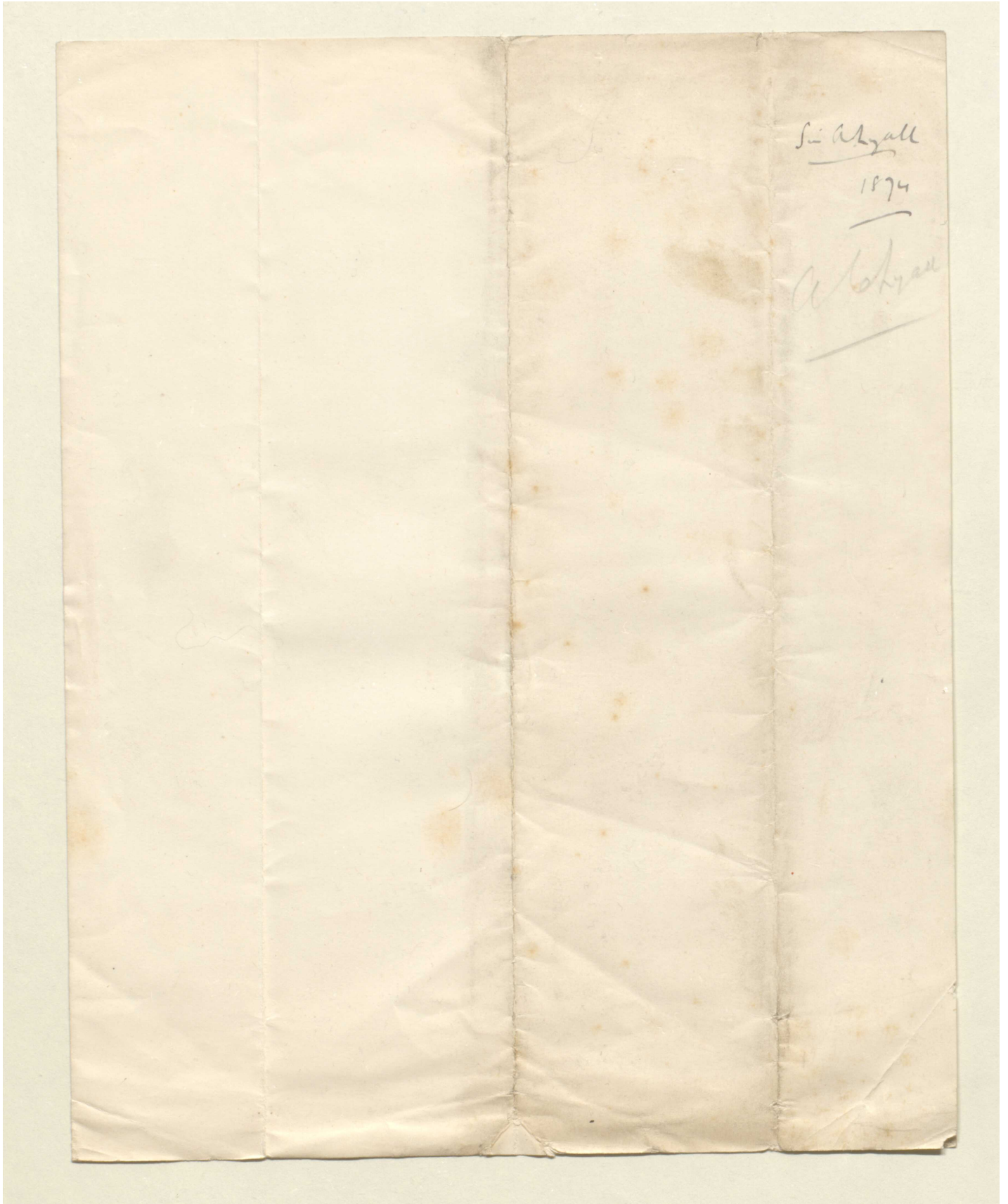
